Dialogue from the private sector: NOKIA

Mr Walid Moneimne, SVP, Head of Nokia Networks EMEA speaks about Nokia's participation in the second phase of the WSIS and ICT 4 all Exhibition.

■ Why do you think it is important for Nokia to play an important role in the field of ICT for development?

Nokia believes that widespread access to mobile telecommunications technology is a powerful solution in the fight against social exclusion as well as being a stimulant of economic development. Dialogue from the private sector: ZTE Corporation

Mr. Wang Peng, Public Relations Director of ZTE Corporation speaks about ZTE Corporations involvement in the second phase of the WSIS and ICT 4 all Exhibition.

■ Why do you think it is important for ZTE Corporation to play an important role in the field of ICT for development?

ZTE is a strong supporter of the role of the WSIS in bringing the benefits of modern technology and communications to all people in the world.

We notice that until recently, the major global ICT companies have come from the longer-established major economies such as USA, Western Europe and Japan. The relatively high cost base of these countries has tended to favour the development of modern communications in richer countries and regions. It has often been difficult for smaller and developing nations to keep up with larger and wealthier countries in the rapidly changing world of modern telecommunications. It is critical however that, in an increasingly global business environment, all countries have the same communications opportunities - to enable each country to benefit from its people's skills and abilities to the best extent possible.

ZTE has a key role to play in helping the less well developed economies move forward into the modern world of wireless and fixed communications. As a Hi-Tech enterprise from the largest developing country - China, we ZTE have rich experience in Telecom sector. We understand the challenges of working within a developing economy, and the pressures and benefits that come from moving rapidly into the modern age of telecommunications

This experience has helped us to bring modern fixed and mobile telecommunications to many developing regions which might otherwise not have been able to do this, or which might have

waited many years before enjoying the benefits of modern communications technology.

On the African continent for example, ZTE was the first Chinese manufacturer to sell telecommunications equipment in Africa and has deployed most ZTE advanced telecom products and services in more than 20 countries. In 2004, ZTE put through Africa's first 3G call in Tunisia.

How are you contributing to the WSIS and parallel events, such as the ICT 4 all Exhibition?

As the first Chinese company to become the official partner of the World Summit of the Information Society (WSIS), ZTE WCDMA, CDMA 2000 1X/EVDO/GOTA, ADSL equipments system and 150 GoTa terminals serve more than 15 000 representatives from over 190 countries during the Summit, and also cover another two important cities: Hammamet and Sousse.

ZTE Senior Vice President Mr Shi Lirong is to make a speech to the 3rd Plenary Session of the WSIS Conference on a subject of «ZTE building a seamless information society» on November 16th. We also introduce our CDMA products at the 6th Global Symposium of Regulators from November 12 – 15.

For the media, ZTE will be announcing a major new Tunisian telecommunications service and organising media demonstrations of advanced telecommunications trials already under way in Tunisian regional centres.

Could you tell us what you will be showcasing at your stand on the ICT 4 all Exhibition?

We are showing our latest leading-edge UMTS 3G wireless technology and multimedia solutions featured with WCDMA «all in one stop» solution, HSDPA, VOD, live digital TV, high-speed internet surfing, mobile videoconferencing, and CDMA2000 EV/DO in booth 1301 of ICT 4 all Exhibition in Kram PalExpo. We aim to demonstrate a wide range of modern telecommunications systems and services which are bringing modern telecommunications to a large proportion of the developing world in countries such as Angola, Algeria, Egypt, Brazil, and India. Visitors to the ZTE stand can see these technologies being used, and can learn how they are making a difference to businesses and to people's lives around the world.

How do you see the role of ICTs for the future of Asian development?

The role of telecommunications is critical to the development of all countries and regions in the world. As an active member of around 30 international standar-dization organizations and forums, we have co-chairman position in 2 working groups of ITU-T and we have become the editor of 9 ITU-T standards relative to NGN, optical transmission and network security. As a number of 3GPP, ZTE is the edi-

tor of three standards involving 3G radio access network and terminal systems.

In particular, ZTE is playing two major roles in the international telecoms community. First of all, we make the implementation of modern communication systems at affordable prices so that countries with limited budgets can still play their part in the world communication network, ensuring that entrepreneurs and developing companies within their countries are not held back from competing in the global business economy. In Algeria for example ZTE has opened a major manufacturing centre,

and is installing a mobile telephone network covering 95% of the country.

We also are enabling many countries to leapfrog from older communication technologies to the newest technologies without unnecessarily investing in interim technologies.

ICT's role worldwide is to ensure that the benefits and pleasures of modern technology and communications are available to as many people as possible, and to ensure that the global economy is a vibrant and open structure that benefits the all people, businesses, countries and regions.

With the most complete product range in the world – covering virtually every sector of the wireline, wireless and handset markets, we aim to deliver innovative, custom-made products and services to customers, helping them to achieve continued revenue growth and to shape the future of the world's communications.

Sharing the Future Pavilion





Visitors will get a glimpse of the Tanzanian journey to the information society through multimedia displays, hands on demonstrations of technological innovations and interaction with local stakeholders.

In the workshops, the theme «Impact of ICT on Tanzanian Livelihoods» will be addressed through interactive presentations and discussions of lessons learnt, through national research and real experiences in the four sub-themes of Inclusive Access, Good Governance, Improving Education Systems, and Empowering Women. The workshops run for 1.5 hours each, beginning at 10:00, and ending at 17:30.

A special event in the evening of Thursday 17th November completes «Tanzania Day». Tanzania will invite distinguished guests

to a National Reception at The Central Place from 18:00 to 20:00. During the reception, the Stockholm Challenge Award will announce a special WSIS Challenge Award for 2006. This announcement will be followed by Once upon a Dot Com, a multimedia theatre performance by young artists from the Bagamoyo College of Arts.
